MDS CODING OF PSYCHOTROPIC MEDICATIONS

As Arkansas partners discuss the usage of antipsychotic medications in our nursing homes, the Office of Long Term Care (OLTC) offers the following guidance for MDS coding:

- 1. Psychotropic drugs (sometimes referred to as *psychoactive* drugs) include the following drug classifications:
 - Antipsychotic;
 - Antianxiety;
 - Antidepressant;
 - Hypnotics; and,
 - Mood Stabilizers.
- 2. The Minimum Data Set (MDS) utilizes the first four classifications. Please see Section N, below.
- 3. Drugs such as Xanax, Valium, Ativan, Depakote, Celexa and Prozac should not be coded as antipsychotics in Section N on the MDS. Those drugs should be classified as follows:
 - Xanax Antianxiety or Hypnotic
 - Valium Antianxiety or Hypnotic
 - Ativan Antianxiety or Hypnotic
 - Celexa Antidepressant
 - Prozac Antidepressant
 - Depakote This drug is a mood stabilizer and not a psychotropic medication; it would not be classified in any of the categories in Section N, below.
- 4. Nursing staff should review their coding practices. Facilities should carefully consider each drug the resident is <u>receiving</u>. Are staff coding PRNs that have never been given (e.g. Section N instructs to code the medications <u>received</u> in the last 7 days)? As stated in the Code tips in the MDS Manual, code per each drug's pharmacological classification.*
